## Late Thule culture arrow shaft-straightener in the form of a kneeling caribou. Wales, Alaska, probably 17<sup>th</sup>-18<sup>th</sup> century, 14 cm







Archaeological arrow shaft-straighteners with or without incised figures are very rare (there do not appear to be any other published examples), since they are typically 19<sup>th</sup> century artifacts. As is frequently seen in carvings of caribou, holes for the insertion of antlers are provided in the top of the head (see also example below).





Ivory late Punuk or Thule culture drag line handle, toy, or amulet in the form of a caribou or reindeer head, with deep eye sockets (inlays missing) and holes on top of the head for insertion of short insets representing antlers. 7.0 cm
