


Fig. 3. The basic motifs of Birnirk graphic design.

This carving is drilled lengthwise through the body, with a slot on the bottom to allow the connection of two lines. The decoration is typical Birnik (Bronshtein, 2006, see Fig. 3-1 and 3-3 below), in an unusually fine example of the small zoomorphic sculptures that are characteristic of Birnik art.
