

## Provenance:

Peter Rosing Stephan V. Barchalia Barchalia family, by descent Sotheby's New York, American Indian Art Sale, June 12, 1992

Collected by Peter Rosing (1892-1965), the Greenlandic-Danish Lutheran pastor in Ammassalik during the period of 1922-1933. He was also well known as a painter, and was the son of Christian Rosing (1867-1945), who served from 1904-1922 as the first Greenlandic pastor in Ammassalik. Peter Rosing was followed as pastor by his brother Otto Rosing (period of 1933-1940). The harpoon was later in the collection of Rosing's brother-in-law, Dr. Stephan V. Barchalia (1884-1944), who served as district doctor in Jacobshavn (1912-1914) and Godthåb, West Greenland (1914-1919 and 1920-1922). It was probably collected by Rosing in early 1922, before Barchalia returned to Denmark in April, 1922 from his last posting in Greenland.

Toornaarsuk is a major helping spirit of special quality whose relative power and importance as described at various times and in different regions are discussed by Sonne (1986).
